I have been three month's absent studying social conditions in Mexico. Now that I am back I hasten to acknowledge the receipt of your book "De California A Harvard". I have had so far only time to dip into it here and there but it is so delightfully written and contains so many penetrating philosophical observations that I promise myself the pleasure of reading it soon. Now that for some months I have been reading and speaking Spanish your book will go very easily for me.

In Mexico I could not but contrast the comparative happy lot of Chile and Argentina with the distracted condition of our neighbor to the south. Certainly social revolutions are exceedingly costly and the more I see of them the more I study how they may be avoided. I want to bring out next spring my third volume dealing with the Russian Revolution for I consider that of such enormous importance that I dedicated a good deal of time to studying it.
