I have just received a letter from Dr. Charles F. Thwing, until recently the President of the Western Reserve University at Cleveland, Ohio. This institution is one of the prominent ones of the United States, but Doctor Thwing himself is even more eminent in educational circles. Probably there is no one in my country who has written more about its educational system in all its phases.

Doctor Thwing advises me that he and his wife expect to make a very brief visit to Chile in the month of March, and in order that his trip may be profitable, he has asked me to send him "such facts and interpretations regarding education in Chile" as I can conveniently send.


